Classroom Happenings

Mrs. Newell (2 Year Old and 3 Year Old Preschool)

This week the 3 year old class learned the letter Z and had their first field trip to the zoo! Lots of fun was had by all. During Bible we learned about when Jesus went back up into Heaven.

Mrs. Rehmer (4 Year Old Preschool)

The highlight of our week was our trip to the zoo! Each group had to find 3 different facts about 3 animals. It was fun to read what each group discovered. Our letter this week was the letter Z for zoo. This week our Bible story was about Jesus' ascension - his return to heaven. Acts 1:6-11.

Mrs. Sherman (Kindergarten)

The rainforest adventure began this week. We made our safari guides and began learning wild and wonderful facts about the environment and animals that live there! Do you have to see something to believe it? Thomas could not believe that Jesus was alive until he could touch the wounds on Jesus' hands and side. It is through faith that we see Jesus in God's word and sacrament. It is through faith that we will see Jesus in heaven. During reading, we read fantasy and realistic texts about the importance of trying hard. We substituted phonemes and identified singular and plural nouns. In math, we decomposed numbers into tens and ones and learned to tell time to the hour.

Mrs. Boerboom (1st Grade)

This week in 1st grade, we completed our Terra Nova testing. We also talked about all of the ways God made us unique and all of the different things we are good at. In math, we worked on counting to 120. We started learning about geography in social studies, and finished our unit on the Earth's surface in science. In Bible Study, we talked about how Jesus appeared to the women and disciples after He was raised from the dead and gave them the job to tell others about Him, and how we can tell others about Him today!

Mrs. Reynolds (2nd Grade)

2nd grade worked really hard to complete our end of the year state testing. We also read the best part of the Easter story. Jesus rose from the dead, and we learned that His resurrection gave us new life. In Reading class we reread "From Seed to Plant" and studied the life cycle of plants. We also drew and labeled the parts of a flower.

Mrs. Dowd (3rd Grade)

The third-grade class did a great job with their state testing this week! In Religion, we learned about sins of commission and sins of omission. We grew our understanding of the Communion symbols and why we have the Lord's Supper in our church service. In Reading, we read Chapters 22-25 and learned about the glass elevator. We are reaching the end of our novel and we are anticipating who will win! In Math, we are comparing fractions with different and the same denominator. In Science, we compared living and nonliving things. In Social Studies, we are learning about the services and goods Ohio produces each year.

Miss Rhonemus (4th Grade)

This week we did Terra Nova testing so our mornings were a bit wonky. For religion, we watched video overviews of the book of John from The Bible Project. Since we usually do math in the mornings during the testing time, students used an online program to review math concepts. We also enjoyed our ABC countdown activities as students found fun facts for **Did** you know?, colored elephants based on math facts for **E**lephant day, wrote recipes with fractions for **F**raction day, played games on **G**ame day, and wore a variety of **H**ats on Friday. In writing, we revisited topic sentences and the structure of a well written opinion paragraph.

Mr. Postenrieder, Mrs. Kiehl, and Mr. Kollmorgen (5th - 8th Grades)

In our Bible time we continued our study of Romans.

The kids took their Terra Nova (Standardized) tests this past week – so many of the classes met fewer times than usual.

In 5th math we worked with mixed number multiplication, while in Saxon Level 1 math, we used cross products to solve proportions.

5th & 6th grade reading students continued working with the novel, Esperanza Rising. In Writing, they worked on poetry. 7th & 8th grade Reading students continued working with the mystery, The Westing Game. In Writing they practiced with directions and how to write an invitation.

In 5th & 6th Social Studies, we presented our power points on the Caribbean Islands. In 7th & 8th Social Studies, students began working with the reformation in Europe.

5th & 6th Science students learned about energy resources and are preparing presentations on different sources of energy. 7th & 8th Science wrapped up their book on weather and climate and started our last unit on sound and light.

In 5th – 8th grade PE we played tennis.
